## Living out my faith Where Is the Holy Spirit Calling Us? Meet Vicar Josh Moss

Josh Moss is a senior student at Wartburg Seminary and will be spending a year at Immanuel as a fulltime intern pastor.

# When will you be joining the ILCSP community as an intern, and how long is your internship?

My family and I have been attending Immanuel for just over a year and many of you have probably seen us around. This upcoming time together is called a 'culminating internship' and will begin June 3rd, 2024, and end around that same time next year. I'll have completed all my class work prior to this internship. I'll serve as Immanuel's first intern pastor or "vicar", since 1976 and I recognize the significance of that. The 'next thing' will be the 'professional' thing' for me. There's a surreal quality to it.



# Describe what led you to go to seminary. What do you find satisfying/fulfilling in your work/studies?

In 9th grade I wrote a science paper titled 'Boiling Over: Chemical Properties in the Lake of Fire,' which led to an interesting conversation with my teacher who was also a pastor. The process of critically engaging Scripture was life-giving for me. Scripture is still what energizes and inspires me most, and I especially love engaging Scripture with others. Seminary, and now Immanuel, provided a structured framework for contextualizing encounters with Jesus in Scripture and moving into the world guided by the Holy Spirit, like moving from a lifetime of preparation into a space where preparation meets purpose.

# What would you say are the gifts/talents that you bring to your work/studies?

I aim for collaboration, curiosity, and calmness to guide how I work and study. I love teamwork because it creates chances for mutual insight and shared successes and is modeled by Jesus' time with his disciples. I admit that curiosity requires constant practice, and I have really enjoyed how it sparks possibilities, especially with groups. Everyone is called to ministry in some kind of way, and encouraging others to lean into their gifts and talents brings me incredible joy. I've found one of the best ways to do that is through collaboration centered on Jesus Christ.

# *Tell about a time you felt you made a difference for someone.*

Caring for my mom during her fight was cancer certainly made a difference for her, but I was really the one to receive the greatest gift. This is when I understood what it meant to journey with someone instead of trying to drive. It was the toughest and the most profound way for me to experience being blessed to be a blessing to others.

### What are you looking forward to in this internship?

I'm really looking forward to getting to know people, learning from their wisdom, and contributing to our shared journey of faith. Do you remember the show The Magic School Bus? Ms. Frizzle always said, "Take chances, make mistakes, and get messy!" We've got 12 months and a lot of folks have given us permission to do that—let's make the most of it and see where the Holy Spirit is calling us together next.

# *What is something you would like the people of Immanuel to know?*

John 11:35, "Jesus wept" ἐδάκρυσεν ὁ Ἰησοῦς, is often cited as the shortest verse in the Bible. However, 1 Thessalonians 5:16, "Rejoice always," Πάντοτε χαίρετε, has fewer characters in the original Greek, so just carry that in your back pocket for a while. I love these verses together because they remind me to recognize the reality of pain, and invite me to draw from the wellspring of joy within and around me; where does that come from, and what is the Holy Spirit saying to us through that? I think this is what Jesus meant when he talked about the Kingdom of God being within, among, and near us—I experience that in the most wonderful way at Immanuel, and I'm so grateful for the opportunities we're sharing. # **Graces Outpoured**

Last July, Paul Stever, Pilgrim Lutheran's Music Director contacted me about the possibility of joining our choirs together for an evening service on Pentecost Sunday. Since Pentecost is early this year, and this is a festival that often gets shortchanged, he suggested that this was the perfect year.

The service would feature Kim André Arneson's beautiful "Holy Spirit Mass." Arnesen is one of the most frequently performed composers from Norway today. The National Lutheran Choir premiered this work in 2017 at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, Washington DC to commemorate the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation. The work also commemorates 50 years of productive Lutheran-Catholic dialogues, with themes of mercy, grace, oneness, praise, hope and a vision for a reconciled future.

## Immanuel's Care Team

One afternoon 24 years ago, JoAnn Hogenson left work and paid a visit to an elderly Immanuel member. On that visit JoAnn shared stories about the people and activities of Immanuel. Mostly she just listened as her new friend told stories about her life.

Today JoAnn is still making these visits. Why does she do it? "I really like old people," she said. She finds them interesting, friendly, and welcoming. On some visits, JoAnn might serve Communion, read from the Bible, or say a prayer with them. Mostly; though it's just talking and listening, and she knows how important these visits are, that's what sustains her to continue to serve on the Care Team Ministry.

The Care Team Ministry, led by Jody Dahl, is a group of volunteers who share JoAnn's dedication. They serve the elderly, both who are in nursing homes or those still at their own homes, in a variety of ways.

In addition to in-person visits, some elderly folks prefer a phone call. The mailing of greeting cards is another well received Care Team program. Judie Prayfrock has an extensive roster of folks who will receive birthday cards, as well as cards at Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and when appropriate, get-well cards. Judie includes a short message in each card along with a Bible verse. Most of her cards are donated by Immanuel members.

The Care Team meets every three months. As team leader, Jody Dahl organizes the Team and as referrals come in, she assigns them to a Care Team member. Jody says that additional members are welcome!

# Reflecting on the Community What Is Your Third Place?

I recently met a friend at a tavern on the northside of St Paul. Although this establishment (Neumann's) is celebrated as the oldest bar in Minnesota, I had yet to visit it. I knew it was one of her favorite hang outs and I thought it was time to check it out.

It didn't take me long to understand why she loves it. Nearly everyone that came into (or out of) the place greeted her with a smile, a hello or a "how are you?" As I drove home that evening, I realized – that small little neighborhood tavern is her "third place".

If you've never heard of a third place, you're not alone. I just caught wind of this term a few months ago. And, when I asked around, nobody else was familiar either. I was intrigued, so I dug into the topic.

The concept and term third place has been around since the late 80s. In 1989, sociologist Ray Oldenburg published a book called *The Great Good Place*. In this book, the author coined the term third place and described it as "public places where people gather, put aside the concerns of home and work (their first and second places), and hang out simply for the pleasures of good company and lively conversation". Hmmm. Do I have a third place?

According to Jeffres et al. (2009), about 71% of US people have their third place. Most common third spaces are (in this order): community centers/town meetings, coffee shops, restaurants/cafes, and churches.

From a sociological perspective, Oldenburg's book describes the important qualities of third places:

- 1) They are inclusive and local
- 2) They create an environment in which everybody knows just about everybody
- 3) They serve as ports of entry for visitors
- 4) They offer a 'neutral ground' space for conversation, idea sharing, and the transmittal of social norms
- 5) They create places for fun and enjoyment
- 6) They create a sense of belonging and connectedness

Over the last three decades, continued studies and articles on the topic of a "third place" have added to the conversation, d. Discussing the concept of it, the importance of it, the loss of it (remember those pandemic days?), and the resurgence of it. All studies seem to agree; a third place is an important contributor to a person's wellbeing and happiness.

More recent studies have associated the importance of the availability of third places to building strong communities. Dr. Richard Kyte, Director of the Reinhart Institute for Ethics (He also happens to be a Minnesota native and Hamline University graduate) – has written a new book called Finding Your Third Place—Building Happier Communities and Making Great Friends Along the Way. *continued on page 8*

# **Our Never-Ending Story**

Over the course of our lengthy church history, members have understood the importance of recording history for future generations.

In 2019, as our 150th celebration approached, two passionate and talented women, Ann Derr and Peggy Johnson, stepped forward to research and create a history book for the celebration. They dug into the back corners of the church building, and sifted through boxes, albums and binders to uncover and preserve our collective church's story. Many current and former members contributed content and photos, but the herculean effort of researching, organizing and editing was vastly owned by Ann and Peggy. **Together, they published the Immanuel Lutheran Church - 150 Years (1871-2021).** 

Recognizing the amount of blood, sweat and *papercuts* that went into assembling Immanuel's rich story, Ann and Peggy (who had a 35-year career as a librarian at the University of Minnesota Libraries), wanted to continue telling the story. Our story.

With generous gifts of time and money from the Improvers, the Men's Club, the ILC Foundation and others, Immanuel now has its first ever dedicated Heritage Room and Heritage Committee. Huzzah!

- **Dedicated space:** The well-outfitted Heritage Room is located in the lower level of the Education Commons. It's equipped with furniture, shelves, and filing drawers. Additionally, it has the digital equipment needed (printer, monitor, PC) to tackle the next big project (continue reading to learn more about this).
- **Committee:** The Heritage Committee, formed by Ann and Peggy, has grown by five and now includes JoAnn Hogenson, Kathy Raiter, Judie Prayfrock, Gay Bartholic, and Lisa Struss. JoAnne was drawn to this committee stating, "We need to value our heritage. Value the services and ministries of those before us. It's inspiring."

The committee mostly works independently, taking direction from the "project sheets" in the committee workbook binder. The committee has been busy. The church bulletins, messengers, and annual reports have been organized and put into storage boxes. And two full file-drawers with documents and photos related to historical events, ministries and people are labeled and organized.

## What's next?

Ann lit up when asked what's over the horizon for the collection. "Well," she said, "our next project is to set up our digital equipment, identify and install software, and establish a process for digitizing our photographs. The current storage and condition of the photos is dire." She carefully pulled a crinkly album from the shelf. It looked like it would turn to dust if dropped. Poof. "We are praying for a volunteer to help us with any part of this project," Ann added.

### How else can the congregation support this effort?

Ann shared, "There's so much help our congregation can offer. We are still missing a lot of history. Especially work completed by committees and ministry teams. And, this is an ongoing mission, and we need the congregation's participation to keep the collection going."

Specific ways you can help:

- Donate historical artifacts, documentation or pictures of past activities.
- Contribute content from activities happening right now and into the future.
- Identify names of people in the *congregation-wide* photo taken in Oct 2022. The Heritage Committee will be asking for help during coffee hours soon.

- *Use* the Heritage room. If you are looking for historic information, let the committee know and they will help you out.

**March:** The Touchpoint team is working hard with the staff, ministry teams, and council to make sure we are using this new system to its best advantage.
